TDCJ Darrington Unit Seminary is modeled after the Angola Seminary at the Louisiana State Penitentiary in Angola, LA which was begun in 1995. After visiting Angola five years ago, Texas State Senators John Whitmire and Dan Patrick were convinced that the same program could be replicated in Texas and help bring about moral rehabilitation through spiritual transformation.

This noted theological seminary launched undergraduate classes at Darrington Unit in 2011 offering a Bachelor of Science in Biblical Studies to 40 inmates. The program is privately funded by the Heart of Texas Foundation, and upon graduation, the inmate Field Minister will go to other prisons in Texas so they can serve on the staffs of Chaplains and help transform the system from the inside out.

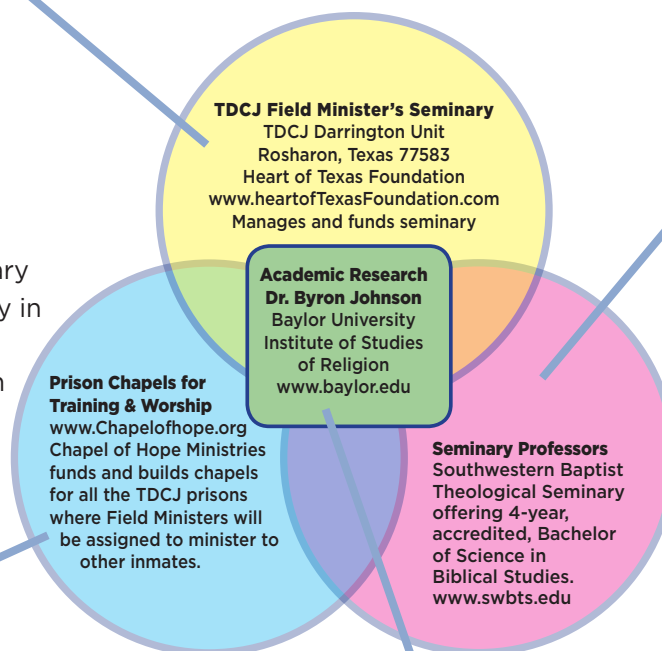
